<b>Question:</b> Are hats and caps without flowing elements (i.e a chefs disguise hat or novelty peaked baseball cap) intended to be covered by clause 4.2 ?		
<b>Proposer's Comments for an answer:</b>		
In the list of applicable items, caps/hats are not specifically named unless associated with mass/hair/string.		
<b>OPTIONS</b>		
1) Any hat/cap is to be considered under hoods, headdresses " <b><u>etc</u></b> ",		
Only hats/caps with flowing elements and/or elasticated attachments are to be considered.		
<b>Interpretation Group Comments/Action:</b>		
If option 2 is the case, then some disguise hats (i.e chefs hat) will only be submitted for general requirement (clause 4.1) as clause 4.3 does not cover headwear.		
It is possible that caps/hats without straps or flowing elements are seen as low risk, hence only the general requirement applies.		
SGS view is that clause 4.2 does not apply to hats and caps without flowing elements or straps etc (i.e a chefs disguise hat or novelty baseball cap).
